

### Hodges Calls For Vehicle Inspection

RALEIGH (AP) — Gov. Hodges came out Wednesday in favor of chemical tests for detecting drunk drivers and for motor vehicles inspection.

In a speech before the third annual Governor's Traffic Safety Council, Hodges noted that both these proposals were part of the legislative program of the Motor Vehicles Department.

"As governor," he told the council members, "I certainly hope that the General Assembly, at its approaching session, will enact the requested legislation."

The governor quoted from figures of the highway safety committee of the National Governors Conference.

They showed traffic deaths over the nation as a whole increased 8 per cent from 1954 to 1955, and an all-time high of 42,000 deaths is anticipated for 1956.

He said even though North Carolina's fatalities are running 6 per cent under last year, "This is small consolation in the face of the fact that 1,000 people have died necessary deaths on North Carolina highways so far this year."

He said a request for funds to increase the highway patrol by 100 men was being studied by the Advisory Budget Commission.

We played our second game Tuesday night with Fines Creek. The girls tied 23-23. The boys won 55-33.

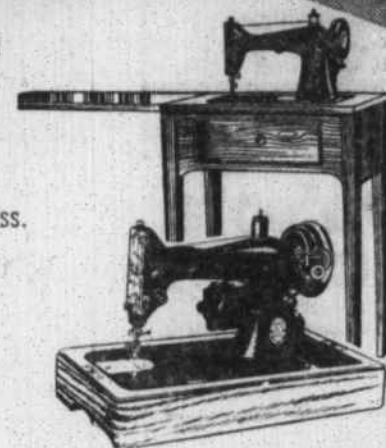
