Sunday School Lesson

More Than Conquerors
 SHOWING HOW THE HOLY SPIRIT HELPS TO FREE US FROM SIN

Scripture—Romans 8.

I FEAR that this lesson is going to be a somewhat difficult one to interpret to young children. The older ones will gain much in studying Paul's words to the Romans and applying his teachings to their own personal lives.

Dr. Wilbur Smith, editor of the *Sunday School Notes* suggests that the teacher might tell of an experience of his, when he was taken by a friend to visit a man of wealth who lived in a house that had not been painted or repaired for years; whose garden had not been tended, fruit trees were uncared for, fine furniture was unused, beautiful books had been put away and never read, and the man himself, past 80 years of age, was living frugally though his wealth totalled \$2 million!

He had been liberal in giving to the Christian cause, but how much more good would he have done if he had made his home a comfortable place for himself to

live in, and a hospitable meeting place for the people of the church and for visiting missionaries, preachers and Christian people, generally, who needed such hospitality.

With all that wealth how much good he could have done with it, if he had helped the poor and unfortunate. And how much happier he would have been if he had let the Spirit of Christ of which Paul writes, guide him!

We all know that from early childhood through our entire lives we are fighting divers temptations. When we are young we are trained in ethical conduct by our parents. For most of us the pattern of our lives, whether for good or evil, is set by our training in the home and by the examples of parents.

Even so, we may, and often are tempted to do wrong—not to commit crimes possibly, but to be selfish, inconsiderate of others, quarrelsome, etc.

How do we overcome these urges? God always helps us if we pray to Him or to His Son.

not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit itself maketh intercessions for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." This Spirit is one of the Trinity—God the Father, Christ His Son, and the Holy Spirit.

When tragedy strikes a family, this may be difficult to believe, but faith in the goodness of God and His help in time of trouble, can still triumph over disaster. Paul writes, "If God be for us, who can be against us?"

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril or sword?"

God sacrificed His Son to die for our sins. He will not forsake us as we go through life if we trust in Him and obey His commandments. Living thus we too can be "More than conquerors", throughout our lives.



The speed of modern life tempts us to think of our goals and to forget the importance of a single step. But the men who scale the highest peaks concentrate on one step at a time.
