Since the writer has been here this fall, two or three of these ultramodern weapons of war have gotten out of control. One called the Matadoe failed to make a proper take-off about two weeks ago-got to "acting up" all at once in such a way that it could not be righted by radio from the control room at the base. So the officials just decided to destroy the unit in midair, which was done. This was accomplished instantly by radio

The missile is about 26 feet long. had only gotten a short distance from the base at the time, and when destroyed intentionally, fell into the Atlantic. Only small fragments of the missile fell, as most of the weapon went up in smoke.


