Gib Batchelor Opens oyster Place Near Here

Gib Batchelor has recently opened up an up-to-date oyster roasting place at Weaver's Bridge, about six miles east of Kenansville. Mr. Batchelor has constructed a very nice building, a two-story structure, with a store and filling station on the upper floor and private rooms on the lower floor for serving couples and parties. At the rear of the building a steam boiler is used for the roasting of oysters. It is interesting to note how it is done. A heavy load of steam is built up in the boiler and a large barrel, connected to the boiler with a pipe is filled with the oysters. Steam is run into the barrel until the oysters are cooked to the extent desired and they are opened and served as you eat.
