

MRS. MURPHY MAKES MONTHLY REPORT TO COMMISSIONERS AND OUTLINES PROGRAM FOR FEB.

During the month of January 200 circular letters were written and mailed, 191 individual letters written, 71 office calls received, 800 club programs made, 33 meetings were attended, 34 homes were visited, 25 new members were enrolled, and 471 club members were in attendance at the 17 women's clubs.

Major Project for January
The major project studied during the month was house furnishing. The Agent gave demonstrations on Refinishing Furniture as one unit of work in this project. The members were shown how to Remove Paint From Old Pieces of Furniture; How to Restore Color; Fillers To Be Used, and How to Refinish; which included Refinishing By Using the Oil and Turpentine method, an inexpensive finish, and The Shellac and Wax Method. Each step was demonstrated and a number of pieces shown which illustrated each step in each process.

This lesson proved to be of especial interest to all members.

Nine Leaders in Each Club

Food Fair
The Mineral Springs, Franklin, Outlaw Bridge, Tommie Williams, Teachey's, and Magnolia Clubs were attended by 28 or more members each. The Mineral Springs club enrolled five new members which brings their total enrollment up to 30. This club has not yet been organized a year.
