One and a half pounds of flakes will be enough for 100 square yards of plant bed when spread ovenly over the ground. Two or three applications a week may be necessary, particularly in times when a strong wind is blowing since the wind blows the gas away from the beds. However, the grower can determine the number of applications needed by watching the beds for further signs of worms. If none are found after the first application, it will not be necessary to use any more flakes."

North Carolina College of Agriculture, has the following to say:

"Tobacco growers should watch classiy for small worms in their tobacco beds at the time the young plants are coming up.

Tobacco bed worms are very destructive and may kill great numbers of the young seedlings by uprooting them before they have gotten a good start.

A few worms in the bed may not cause a great deal of damage, but if the beds are neglected there is grave danger of the worms in festing them in great numbers and killing most of the plants.

Use Naphthalene flakes as a control measure. Thousands of farmers have gotten satisfactory results in this way. The flakes give off a gas which kills the worms but does not injure the plants when applied according to instructions.

One and a half pounds of flakes will be enough for 100 square vards of blant bed when spread
