

### Theo Middleton Laid To Rest

Magnolia, May 2nd.—After twelve years of feeble illness, the finger of God touched Mr. Theodore Middleton Sunday at 6:15 P. M. and released him from suffering and called him to "come up higher." He was the last of nine sons of David John and Lucy Middleton to join them in the world beyond. He was born in Lanefield Community, Sept. 1st 1866 and was seventy years old in June 1895, was married to Miss Lizzie Crump of Warsaw and came to Magnolia forty years ago.

He was salesman for H. E. Newberry fourteen years. In September 1909 he opened up business for himself and conducted successfully business of general merchandise till his last illness when he sold out to Mr. J. P. Tucker.

He joined Johnsons Baptist Church in life and was faithful in the performance of his duties. He moved his membership to the Magnolia Baptist church after making this home and in 1902 was elected assistant Superintendent of Sunday School, serving fifteen years until 1917 when he was elected Superintendent, which office he held until he was called away, serving in all 33 years.

He was Deacon about 28 years and served many years as church clerk and treasurer. He was one of the greatest leading spirits in the church and his influence and many places of service will be greatly missed. He was looked up to in the town as being one of our purest and best men in thought and deed.

His companion preceded him four years ago. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. D. E. Hill of Portsmouth, Va., and Mrs. T. H. Williams of Magnolia, two grand sons, Gladstone and Theodore Hill, Rev. E. N. Johnson of Mt. Olive, assisted by Rev. R. C. Foster of Warsaw conducted the funeral in the Baptist church Monday at 4:00 P. M. in the presence of a host of relatives and friends. The choir sang "How Firm a Foundation" and "It Is Well With My Soul." Mr. Foster read 23rd Psalm and other comforting scripture. Mr. Johnson paid beautiful tribute to Mr. Middleton's life and read tributes paid by his two-son-in-laws, Rev. D. E. Hill and Rev. T. H. Williams.
