McLendon Urges Immediate Control Of Tobacco Bud Worms

Tobacco bud worms do considerable damage to the tobacco crop every year in Duplin County and this damage is done early in the season while the tobacco plant is small. A considerable amount of this damage is done before the farmer realizes it.

The tobacco bud worm is the same worm that feeds on roasting ear corn and must have food before corn comes in. His food preference is corn and therefore he is easily controlled.

The control measure to be used is 1 lb. of calcium arsenate or arsenate of lead mixed thoroughly with 75 pounds of corn meal. Preferably this corn meal should be sifted in order that it can be put out easily. This mixture should be applied early in the morning and late afternoon while the bud leaves are standing open by placing the meal and poison in the bud. Corn being the bud worm food, they will leave the tobacco in order to eat the corn meal and while eating the poison they do not damage the tobacco. An application of the meal and poison should be made immediately and depending on rainfall, second application should be made in 10 days or two weeks later.
