Everybody that we know has a good excuse for not doing more for unfortunate fellow citizens but all of them say it is for their own good.

THE CONSTITUTION

The people of Duplin County have been interested in recent discussion of the Supreme Court's decision in regard to the NRA and have been hearing suggestions that the Constitution be amended in order to give to the Federal government undisputed power to deal with social and economic questions.

Inasmuch as the issue will no doubt be directly before us in the course of the next few years it might be well to understand a few things about the Constitution, the Courts and the government. The right to amend the document of our liberty is as valuable as the instrument itself and no founder of our government ever intended to deny to the people that privilege.

It is the function of the Supreme Court to interpret the Constitution and apply it in relation to new laws. That this was done in the NRA case cannot be doubted, nor does any person have the right to assail the judges because of their interpretation of interstate commerce.

It is, none the less, the right of the President, or of any political group in this country, to propose amendments to the Constitution, and no one has any particular ground for criticism when such amendments are proposed. The sanctity of the Constitution is acknowledged when change is proposed through constitutional methods.

It is, lastly, the right of the people of the United States, acting as provided by law, to amend, abolish or alter their Constitution. Whenever the required number of citizens of this republic believes that their welfare would be better safeguarded by such changes it is their right to act and no one should criticize, attempt to abridge that right which is of vital importance. The Constitution is a great document of liberty only so long as it serves human needs and whenever it fails to do so reform is imperative.

In this discussion we take no position in regard to the coming battle over widening the powers of the Federal government. Those who believe in the Constitution will be divided on the two sides of the debate; those who are against the Constitution will be advocating something besides a constitutional amendment.

A LIQUOR AD

We wish to call attention to an advertisement by a manufacturer of whiskey. In one of its advertisements Seagram's says: "Drinking and driving do not mix." The advertisement proceeds:

"Liquor has no place in the front seat of an automobile Alcohol and gasoline do not mix . . . It is very much to our self-interest to see that the privilege of drinking is not abused . . . Whiskey is a luxury which should be treated as such. It should be taken in moderation—and only in its proper place . . . Neither whiskey nor any other alcoholic liquor has any place at the wheel of an automobile."

This shows that some of the manufacturers of liquor fully realize the danger of letting an intoxicated man drive a powerful automobile on crowded highways or streets. We hope the law enforcement agencies of North Carolina will have convictions just as decided on this matter. Any one who tries to drive an automobile in North Carolina while under the influence of liquor should be arrested and put in jail because such a person is endangering the lives of other people who have a right to be safe when traveling to and fro.

Law enforcement officers should likewise be on the alert to prevent liquor-hogs from making the streets and public places objectionable to law-abiding and decent citizens. If the police will promptly arrest and take off the streets or out of circulation the first few people who become objectionably drunk and disorderly they will set a good precedent and will do a great deal to prevent the consumption of whiskey becoming a great nuisance to other people.

There are many people who can drink in moderation and whose drinking does very little harm to other people. Those who cannot so control themselves should be made to stay out of public places where their drunkenness will be objectionable and distasteful to others exercising their rightful privilege of walking the streets or circulating in public places.
