**MRS. SANDERSON IS 3RD.**  
Mrs. John Hill Sanderson of the Miller Home Demonstration Club was awarded third winner in the Project Leaders' Report contest sponsored by the Miller Club at their July meeting.

Mrs. Sanderson has just completed painting the walls, woodwork and floors of her living room and has offered this room as a demonstration to her club members. Mrs. Sanderson has made a splendid leader for her club and her report shows a tremendous amount of work done by her and the 48 co-workers in her club. The report follows:

"I was appointed House Furnishing Leader of our Club last October. At the following meeting in November I gave a demonstration on how to make an Old Floor Mop. This mop was made by cutting strips from the tops of old socks and treating them with kerosene. After the strips were sewed together the mop was dropped into a jar, the sides of which had been brushed with kerosene. Balled linseed oil may be used to good advantage. This demonstration proved that we can save untold amounts of money by making our mops at home.

In December I collected pictures and showed our members how to properly set a Christmas table.

In the spring I attended the County Council and Leaders Meeting at which time I received a lot of valuable information on how to properly conduct a club meeting, and other helpful suggestions.

In March I gave a demonstration on Refinishing Furniture, and refinished a chair with the oil mixture. Again in March I attended a Leader's School at Kenansville conducted by Miss Helen Estabrook, State Specialist. I received at this school a lot of valuable information on walls and wall finishing, also floors, and how to properly arrange draperies. I too, received samples of different wall finishes and in April gave a demonstration on Walls and Wall Finishes at our club meeting. At this meeting I showed pictures of different walls in colors and samples of different Floor Finishes.

In May I joined the House furnishing Contest which is being sponsored by each club in the county. Since then I have painted my living room through our Home Agent's instructions, demonstrating that we can save by doing our work. I also varnished my floor and rug to show the finished work.

I find in checking up our House-furnishing reports by every club member all have rehanging pictures, purchased towels, bed linen, and new curtains. Quite a number have had remodeling work done and have purchased new furniture.

Some new members have joined the housefurnishing contest and

others are planning to join later as this contest will last through the 30th of next April.

Our aim is to do much improving at little cost thereby eliminating the possibilities of "borrowing". In order to do this we are learning to do a good paint job, how to mix paint, stain floors and refinish furniture. And what a valuable lesson.
