Wilson Fame As Tobacco Market

vice the majority of these members have, for more than a quarter of a century, enjoyed a large clientele throughout the bright tobacco belt. The nine warehouses in Wilson cover an area of twenty acres, and have a combined floor space of thirty five thousand baskets, which average 110 to 120 pounds of bright tobacco per basket. These warehouses are the most modern and well equipped in the world, and have enough available space to justify the placing of approximately 4,000,000 pounds of tobacco on their floors. At the selling rate of 360 baskets of tobacco per hour, buyers can easily purchase an average of 1,350,000 pounds, daily.

Because of the great amount of tobacco produced and marketed in this section, and because of the geographical location of Wilson, plus the splendid transportation facilities, the large tobacco companies, engaged in buying tobacco for export and home consumption, found this to be the logical location to erect large re-drying plants and storage houses.

"The Smoke Flower" Pageant To Be Shown Four Eastern Fairs

Kinston, N. C., Aug. 21st. Contracts have been signed with the Harrington-Russell Festival. Producers of Pageant and out-door amusement plays, to write and present their new Pageant, "The Smoke Flower" at four of the Agricultural Fairs that is being sponsored by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, this fall, according to a statement made by N. G. Barlett, Secretary of the present organization. The Pageant will deal with the tobacco industry from its beginning and bring it up to the present time, which is called the "Cigarette" age, according to the authors. Six hundred will make up the cast from each of the local communities. It will be the first time that a Tobacco Pageant has ever been presented in the history of the tobacco industry the producers say.

The Fairs that will have this special attraction are: Kinston, October 9, Greenville, October 23, Dunn, October 21 and Woodland October 30. The pageant will be presented at night with special lighting effects, a professional

band, trained in this show, special scenery and costumes to suit the different episodes. "It is the most expensive program we have ever attempted," Secretary Barlett said and it has been made possible only by the cooperation of the American Tobacco Co. Liggett & Meyers Tobacco Co. and R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. The companies were requested to help finance the project and very gladly agreed to help put the project over. It will be a great educational undertaking for the entire tobacco growing section, the officials of the organization stated. The days the pageants are staged will be designated as "Tobacco Day" and entire thought of the day will be "Tobaccowards", Mr. Barlett said. The citizens are urged to lend their cooperation to this movement with the hope that Eastern Carolina will again be the first to ever "show" tobacco in its every stage of development.

HOLC Foreclosure

The HOLC came to their assistance and most of them are now able to keep their homes as a result of its efforts.

The Corporation in cases of continued genuine distress has permitted borrowers temporarily to

postpone at least part of their payments. Foreclosure has occurred only in instances of abandonment, willful delinquency, legal complications or the death of the borrower, and not in any case of plain distress. Home owners who are clearly in difficulty are given every consideration.

On the other hand, such leniency is possible only where the borrower can prove his present inability to meet his payments, and that he is acting in good faith. Investigation of more than 5000 requests by HOLC borrowers for postponement of their instalments revealed that less than 1100 of them were actually in difficulties. The other 3900 were merely seeking to evade their obligations. Their demands were not granted, and most of them have paid up, rather than lose their homes. To imply that the HOLC is a "shylock" in foreclosing against persons who refuse to pay when they pay is to argue that dishonest people should be given free ownership of their homes on the Federal credit, at heavy cost to everyone else.

Drivers Licenses Be Ready September 1

The distribution of the state drivers licenses will begin about September 1st according to Director Scott of the Revenue Department. One million application blanks are being printed and will be distributed to 870 automobile dealers in the state, to county clerks and to police departments, for the convenience of those who are to se-

sure them. The application must be certified before a county clerk, highway patrolman, or other person authorized to administer oaths. The application will contain a description of the applicant and his or her signature. Badges will be required for all chauffeurs.

Until November 1st these licenses will be issued without charge and without examination to persons who have had one year or more of driving experience, and have not been convicted of traffic law violation within the past year. Operators licenses, unless revoked, suspended or cancelled, will remain in force for at least three years, when the Department of Revenue may cancel the license and issue new ones. Chauffeurs' licenses, for which a charge of \$2 will be made will expire each June 30.

All operators and chauffeurs will be required to secure licenses, but no licenses will be issued to any operator under 16 years of age, or to any chauffeur under 18 years of age, or to any chauffeur of a common carrier under 21 years of age. Persons morally, mentally or physically unfit will not be issued licenses.
