Answered At College

QUESTION: Does plowing under tobacco stalks after harvest benefit the land?

ANSWER: There is a small amount of plant food in green tobacco stalks but the greatest benefit comes from the control of insect pests. If left standing in the field the stalks furnish breeding places for millions of insect pests that will attack the crop next season and for that reason alone they should be either cut or plowed under.
