

# 5000 At Fulcon To Hear Speeches

Kenansville, N. C., Sunday afternoon, August 18, 1935. The address of the Rev. C. E. Burgess and C. E. Burgess, Jr., before a packed audience of about five thousand people in the large auditorium of the Fulcon Hotel was a most interesting and timely one. The Rev. Burgess, who was in the large audience, was willing to give up his service. People were standing at the two side entrances trying to get in position to hear the speaker.

A crowd of mixed voices was heard from the choir which was accompanied by a piano and orchestra. Several special selections were sung by soloist and the trio.

Dr. Spence was the first speaker of the evening and for about an hour he gave facts after facts which showed the uselessness of liquor and the harm that it was doing. A number of cases were given by the speaker which he has seen or come in contact with personally and he held the challenge before the people to drive out liquor in any and every form for conscience sake. Dr. Spence spoke along the lines of education against liquor with which the readers of the TIMES are familiar in the articles by Dr. Spence which have been appearing each week. Dr. Spence urged all who were interested to write to his office in Goldsboro for material on the great evil to drive out liquor which he had started and is supporting.

C. E. Burgess followed Dr. Spence and hit along a different line of thought on the same subject. Mr. Burgess challenged the 500 ministers of the state who were sitting quietly by, to take some action against the onrush of this evil. If the church leaders and church members would do their part and take their stand against the evil of liquor, we could drive all the liquor out of the state in six months the speaker said. Mr. Burgess turned to the Bible, stating that he was still old-fashioned enough to believe and accept it, and proved to the audience that any man who was drinking liquor, or was advocating the drinking of liquor and by so doing was causing man to fall before the snare of this demon, was sinning against Christ. A boy who followed a drunkard into drink-

ing for that set has already disgusted the boy, but the so-called respectable man who will take his drink and carry it is the man that is bringing damnation upon the men and women of tomorrow. Dr. Spence and Mr. Burgess could both truthfully say the words of Billy Sunday, "I will fight liquor until Hell freezes over."

## Cotton Certificates Expected Soon

The new 1935 Cotton Tax-Exemption Certificates for the use of producers to gin their 1935 crop of cotton are expected to arrive at the County Agents office the first or second week in September. They are now being issued by the State Allotment Board in Raleigh says Mr. McLendon. Each producer, landlord, tenant and share cropper who will have certificates issued to them will receive a card notifying them when the certificates arrive and each one will have to receipt at the County Agents Office for his certificates.

The old 1934 Certificates which was sent to Washington for re-issue for use in this crop season will also arrive soon. If any Cotton producer has overlooked bringing into the County Agents Office their old left-over poundage they should do this at once says Mr. McLendon, as they will not be accepted by the gins in lieu of Tax this ginning season unless they have been re-issued in another color.
