## Walnut Cracking Is A Growing Industry

Black walnuts as a source of cash income, are bringing North Carolina farmers thousands of dol-lars each year.

Harvesting the annual crop, which runs into hundreds of thou-sands of bushels in this State a. lone, is now an emportant indus-try, according to R. W. Graeber, extension forester at State Col-

ed kernels, in grocery, candy, and drug, stores almost everywhere.

In Yadkin County, where walnut cracking has become a community enterprised case iffamer: reported the sale; of /16 harrels of kernels during the past season. A superior court judge in Daudson County got 23 bushels of a puts

County got 23 bushels of nuts from one tree and a farmer in Al-legitarity County sold \$256 worth of nuts from his farm in one year. This is only an indication of the walnut business in North Carolina, Gracher said. One farm cooperative organization bought 90,000 lbs.

Soon after the nuts have fallen from the trees, they should be ga-thered so that they may be hulled while the husk is still partly green, Graeber pointed out. Our type corn shellers are often used for hulling the nuts.

After they have dried in a shady place for two or Liree weeks, the nuts are ready for tracking, storage, or seed. Cracking may be done with a hamme ,although many prefer one of the commercial crack-ers which are now on the market. A crackery operator told Gaeber that with one hand machine he had been able to crack 10 bushels of nuts a day over a period of many
