Rose Hill, Sept. 4.—Citizens of three railroad towns appear before Duplin County Commissioners Monday with a petition bearing the names of more than 600 citizens, including Town Commissioners, and other organizations, asking that Board to reconsider their Duplin County road projects and recommend to the State Highway Commission, the building, constructing and hard-surfacing of the road from Warsaw to Wallace, via Magnolia, Rose Hill and Teachey, parallel to the A. C. L. R. R. as the first hard surface road project for Duplin County, for the reason that it is the most important road project in Duplin County.
