The new plan proposes a loan of 10 cents per pound on 7-8 low middling or better. Instead of making the adjustment payment on the basis of the four months average of 10 spot markets, this adjustment payment will now be based on the daily average of the 10 markets. The adjustment payment will be made on the basis of the 10 spot market average on the actual day that the cotton is sold by the producer. These adjustment payments will be made through the cotton year up to August 1st 1936. They will be made to producers who have cooperated in the adjustment program and who agree to participate in the 1936 program. Adjustment payments to cotton farmers will be limited to 2c per pound. Loans and payments will be re-

stricted to actual production not in excess of the Bankhead Allotment, and the adjustment payments will apply to all sales of 1935 Cotton.

Cotton Growers are urged to keep sales records, says Mr. Mc-Lendon, County Agent for Duplin County.
