

Wallace Is Boosting Big Tobacco Market

spirit of "never say die" the Wallace warehousemen and merchants have come together in a cooperative program and a determination to sell their market to the farmers of Duplin and surrounding counties. Wallace is Duplin County's only tobacco market and due to its location should develop into a large market for the more than 15,000,000 pounds of weed grown in this county.

The close proximity of the Wallace market to the farmers of Duplin is believed to be one of the strongest incentives to the growers to sell their tobacco on the Wallace market.

Wallace is boasting a high average this season so far and many unusually high averages are being made daily.

The two warehouses are manned

by experienced and capable tobacco men and the buyers on the Wallace market are well trained in their business and know good tobacco when they see it. It is not unusual at all to walk behind the auctioneer and hear him knock off a pile of good tobacco for 30 cents and more.

The fact that Wallace is a home market, manned by Duplin county men gives a certain familiarity between the market and the farmer that is not found on foreign markets. The warehousemen are interested in the tobacco sold on their floors because it is grown by men whom they come in contact with every day in the year.
