ATTACK BY PARACHUTE

The army of Soviet Russia has been ranked first in the world by the French General Lohseau, Vice-Chief of Staff, after seeing the Red Army maneuver at Kief. He saw the Soviet army launch an attack by parachute and commented as follows:

"Your aviation, too, merits the highest praise, whether in large or small formations or individual action. As for the parachute attack, I consider that factor unprecedented in the world, and I was particularly impressed by the fact that it was not a mere display but a performance of highly qualified men who had volunteered into a disciplined attack within a few minutes of landing. An amazing new type of soldiers."

REVIVING HUMAN BEINGS

The revival of human beings after "incomplete death" will be attempted by a new institute being organized in Russia under the direction of Dr. S. S. Brukhonoko, who has experienced with reviving animals.

Incomplete death is defined as death in an accident where vital organs are intact and the Russian has perfected an artificial heart to keep blood circulating until the heart renews its work. He says the mechanism must be applied within forty minutes to revive an animal and, presumably, a person.

People who may be inclined to laugh at the proposed institute might remember that artificial respiration snatches many people from the grave. Without its aid some of our living would be entirely dead instead of enjoying life after an experience that might certainly be classed as "incomplete death."

EDUCATION TAINTED

"One trouble with education in America today," says President Emeritus Poteat of Wake Forest College, "is that it is being tainted with commercialism."

Dr. Poteat declared that despite increased enrollments in schools and colleges and other educational activities America as a whole was still an ignorant country.

"Real culture such as we find in large measures in Great Britain is still at a premium," said Dr. Poteat.

The advance of commercialism in the colleges had resulted in the introduction of courses which have no rightful place in higher education, he said. "We have even got to the point where you can buy scholarship."

The complaint of Dr. Poteat may be justified in part. When one sees the standing of a college more affected by the football team than the scholarship of the faculty one wonders considerably, especially when nowadays whole football teams are sometimes imported into colleges by coaches who want to make good.

The old formula of higher education was probably devoted too much to the development of the literary and cultural, to the neglect of the practical and useful subjects, which became available with the advance of knowledge and science.

In all probability some institutions have deserted the old cultural subjects too much and gone entirely into the commercial or practical. It is doubtless hard for an educator to maintain an even balance between the practical necessities of a new age and the older, cultural traditions of the previous years.

Rubinoff And His Violin On Air Again
