## 1935 Basketball Season In County On High Standard

Speaking in terms of basketball Duplin County enjoyed one of its greatest seasons last year. Basketball play all over the county was of a higher type than usual, and several outstanding teams were developed. The season was brought to an end by a very successful County Tournament.

Indications are that girls basketball may be of higher order in this county this season than the boys game. It may be bad policy to attempt to pick winners this early in the season, but it seems that Chingapin and Rose Hill have prospects of having great girls' teams again this year. The girls squads in these schools are made up largely of experienced players who are sure to be as good, if not better than they were last year.

They also have capable reserves to fill the places of those lost to the team by graduation.

From this distance it looks as if this year's boys race may be a mad scramble. Several teams appear to have possibilities of developing into better than fair clubs and one or more really great teams may make their appearance out of this heap. Kenansville, Wal-

lace, Rose Hill, and Beulaville seem to have better than an even chance for a successful season, with Kenansville holding a slight edge over all the other county teams.

Duplin County teams won several championships last year and were second to none in this district. In addition to winning the county championship in the boys division last year, Kenansville also won the Wilmington Star's Invitational Tournament. The Rose Hill boys, while not completing in the county tournament, won the Kinston Eastern North Carolina Invitational Tournament, the Clinton Invitational Tournament, the Dunn Invitational Tournament, and were runners up in the C. A. Division of the Atlantic Christian College Tournament. The Rose Hill girls in addition to being runners up in the County Tournament won the Clinton Invitational Tournament and the Dunn Invitational Tournament.

The winning of these championships has placed County sports on a very high level. Duplin's record last year is an enviable one. Here is hoping it may be just as good this year!

In talking to several principals and teachers of this county this writer has found them to be very much in favor of the formation of a County Basketball Conference. Every person interviewed up to this time has expressed himself as highly in favor of the Conference. Superintendent O. P. Johnson very strongly approves the Conference idea and has promised his wholehearted support in bringing it about.

As yet, no plans for the Conference have been offered. All plans would have to be drawn up by a committee and submitted to all the principals and county Superintendent for approval and adoption. It is pretty generally understood by those who have discussed the Conference question, however, that a regular schedule requiring every county school to play two games with every other county school would be adopted, and as far as possible these games would be on return game basis. The games would be played in a period of two and one-half or three months. Each school would play two conference games a week. Eligibility rules, admission charges and other necessary questions would be determined by the members of the Conference. Referees and other game officials would be selected and approved by the Conference members as a whole, or by the coaches and principals of the two schools.
