The one hundred and eighth annual Session of the Eastern Baptist Association met with the Magnolia Baptist Church October 8 and 9, 1935. One of the largest crowds to attend an association in recent years was present for the opening sessions.

Total W. M. U. Membership 1,326, an increase of 121. Total B. T. U. Membership 613, an increase of 111.

Total contributions for local church expenses \$25,314.49, an increase of \$4,319.94. Total contributions for Missions \$7,500.03, an increase of \$1,266.53.

The one minute reports from the churches were very interesting.
