

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

"GIVEN" TO THE GOVERNMENT
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Head Farm Loan Bank States Policies

French Lick, Ind., Oct. 5.—The 600,000 farmers who own stock in the Federal land banks through their national farm loan associations in excess of \$100,000,000 have built a permanent cooperative farm mortgage system which is an important factor in the farm lending field and as such will continue to have a wholesome effect on interest rates and terms of farm mortgages. This statement was made here today by W. J. Myers, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, at the annual meeting of the Mortgage Bankers Association of America.

Governor Myers cited the fact that interest rates on farm mortgages averaged around 8 per cent 19 years ago when the banks were chartered and that these permanent cooperative institutions since then have made loans at 5 to 6 per cent on a nation-wide basis. Following the establishment of the Farm Credit Administration, he said, rates have been pushed down to the all-time low in this field—4 per cent.

The Governor stressed the fact that these banks are not government banks, that prior to the emergency the farmers owned practically 100 per cent of the stock and that they now own nearly half, and the way is open for them again to own them completely.

"Because these banks have been temporarily called upon to handle emergency refinancing loans from government-appropriated funds, there may be some justification for the misbelief that they are not cooperative and belong to the government," the Governor conceded. "People forget that the Federal land banks were established as farmers' cooperative credit institutions. They have a 19 year record of making sound first mortgage farm loans, having built up a two billion dollar business on that basis and are continuing to make loans on a cooperative basis without any essential change.

"These banks have given farmers better terms than they could secure elsewhere not only as to interest rates but also the long terms for which the loans run and the provision for systematic, orderly repayment in small installments. Compared with interest rates previously paid, farmers with

Federal land bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans will save over \$5,000,000 this year on interest alone.

"The total loans by the Federal land banks," he said, "now exceed \$2,000,000,000. One out of every 4 mortgaged farmers has a cooperative loan, for the number of Federal land bank loans now exceeds 900,000.

"Building along much the same lines as the cooperative Federal land banks, 560 production credit associations have been organized and have been furnishing short-term production credit during the last two years, now having loans outstanding amounting to \$119,000,000. Similarly, credit has been made available to farmers cooperative buying and selling organizations, through the establishment of 13 banks for cooperatives. These banks have served the credit needs of over 1,000 local cooperative marketing and purchasing organizations which is 5 times the number served at any one time by the old Federal Farm Board.

"In brief," Governor Myers said, "the Farm Credit Administration is a cooperative credit system through which farmers reach the investment market and obtain funds for long-term credit, short-term credit and credit for cooperative marketing and purchasing organizations. These loans are made on terms fitted to farmers' needs and at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practice."

Auto Crash To Be Held At State Fair

BROKEN LEGS and fractured skulls never had a definite market value.

In fact they weren't on the market at all until some bright minded promoter placed an ad to hire a "head-on-collision artist."

Now the market will be established if anyone answers the following classified ad which appears in today's paper—

WANTED—Single man to drive stock automobile in a head-on-collision with another automobile at the North Carolina State Fair, Raleigh, Tuesday afternoon only, October 15th in connection with B. Ward Beam's new 1935 International Congress of Daredevils. Must crash at speed of forty miles per hour or no pay, have driver for other car. Must give unconditional release in case of injury or death. Name terms, address B. Ward Beam, care North Carolina State Fair, Raleigh, N. C.

When the ad was inserted Beam was asked if he expected to receive any applicants, and he answered in the affirmative, saying many would apply, but few realize that it takes real daring to drive head-on into another car which will be man-

ned by another daredevil who will be driving at equal speed. Asked if the men had any protection, the promoter said they would use no safety devices except an English crash helmet.

This is but one of fourteen thrillers that will be on the afternoon program; other stunts will be Eddie Wells jumping out of an airplane at an altitude of 600 feet and dropping a mile before he opens his parachute. Two fearless daredevils will race on two specially built racing motorcycles crashing through flaming solid board walls at the finish line, there will be A. J. Push Ball, Roman Standing stunts on motorcycles, Chariot Races, Motorcycle Balloon Bunting contests, funny Fords and other new features. The Congress of Daredevils will appear on this one afternoon only.

Two daredevils on specially built racing motorcycles will compete in a match race and at the finish line both will crash through two flaming solid board walls as one of the thrillers in connection with B. Ward Beam's International Congress of Daredevils at the N. C. State Fair, Raleigh, Tuesday afternoon, only, October 15th.

This feature is known as the Race of Death and it will be the first time that two daredevils have ever attempted to put on a board wall crash simultaneously and is considered one of the outstanding features of the Thrill Day program. There will be motorcycle races between many of the outstanding riders of the country. A head-on-collision between two automobiles, and Eddie Wells will jump out of an airplane at an altitude of 6,000 ft. and drop a mile before opening his parachute. Ray Kennedy will jump over an automobile with a motorcycle. Buster Anderson will perform acrobatic feats perched high above a racing motorcycle. Bill Powers will attempt a Roman standing thriller on the shoulders of two stunting motorcycle riders. There will also be motorcycle chariot races, auto polo, and push ball.
