

New 5 Year Old Star Features Duplin's Attractions For Next Week; Marion Davies Coming

Opening the program at the Duplin Theatre next week is film-dom's new sensational 5-year-old baby star Sybil Jason in the "Little Big Shot," the Warner Bros. production, which marks the American film debut of the 5 year old genius, has been booked for Monday and Tuesday at the Duplin Theatre. It is said to be a powerful drama that contains hilarious comedy, touching pathos and a delightful romance.

The story by Harrison Jacobs was made into a screen play by three ace writers, Jerry Wald, Julius J. Epstein and Robert Andrews.

There is a four star cast headed by Sybil Jason, and including Glenda Farrell, Robert Armstrong and Edward Everett Horton.

Sybil, who is not yet six years of age, plays the part of an orphan who is adopted by two men living by their wits.

She wins their hearts and eventually brings about their reform, with the aid of Glenda Farrell, who has an entirely different role to her usual vamping, gold-digging parts. In this picture she is a cheek room girl, who knows all the answers, but she longs for a home in the country and love.

Robert Armstrong and Edward Everett Horton have the roles of the two near crooks, who fall in love with little Sybil and risk their own necks to get her back from a gang of kidnapers.

Armstrong and Horton are responsible for the hilarious laughter in the piece, and also for many tender scenes. Sybil, besides having a real acting role, in which she amazed the hard boiled film colony, also sings, dances and mimics in this picture.

The Wednesday showing will be Edmund Lowe in "Thunder In The Night" featured with Miss O'Connor.

Charming Marion Davies, America's outstanding motion picture star, will appear at the Duplin Theatre Thursday and Friday in "Page Miss Glory" her first Cosmopolitan Picture to be released by Warner Bros.

Supporting Miss Davies is a remarkable all star cast of famous "name players" including Dick Powell, Pat O'Brien, Mary Astor, Frank McHugh, Lyle Talbot, Patsy Kelly, Barton MacLane, Allen Jenkins, Hobart Cavanaugh and a score of others. "Page Miss Glory" was a big hit on the Broadway stage.

McHugh, learning that an advertiser is offering a big cash reward for a photograph of America's prettiest girl, makes a composite picture, blending the features of famous stage and society beauties and submits it under the name of "Dawn Glory."

He wins the prize and trouble starts. A "Dawn Glory" craze sweeps the country and even Miss Davies falls for it with startling results. Properly attired and "made-up," she becomes the reincarnation of Dawn Glory, but all she wants to be is the sweet-heart of Dick Powell.

The action is fast and furious. Miss Davies, one of the screen's most beautiful women, wears some gorgeous gowns especially designed for her by Orry Kelly.
