QUESTION How long does it take to fatten beef cattle for market?

ANSWER: Under average conditions, cattle taken from pasture with no additional feed cannot be satisfactorily fattened under four months. Where there is sufficient feed it is better to feed them out for four and one half to five months. The extra weight and finish will more than pay the feed cost and the cattle will bring a premium for the prime finish.

QUESTION Should turkeys be confined before killing and what to the shrinkage on dressed turkeys?

ANSWER It is a good practice to confine the turkeys for from 18 to 24 hours before they are killed. During this time a liberal supply of water should be provided but no feed given. Where turkeys are dressed but not drawn there will be about a 10 percent loss of feathers and blood. Full-drawn turkeys lose about 25 percent of their live weight. When the birds are to be shipped care should be given to proper packing. See your farm or home agent for specific instructions as to killing and packing.
