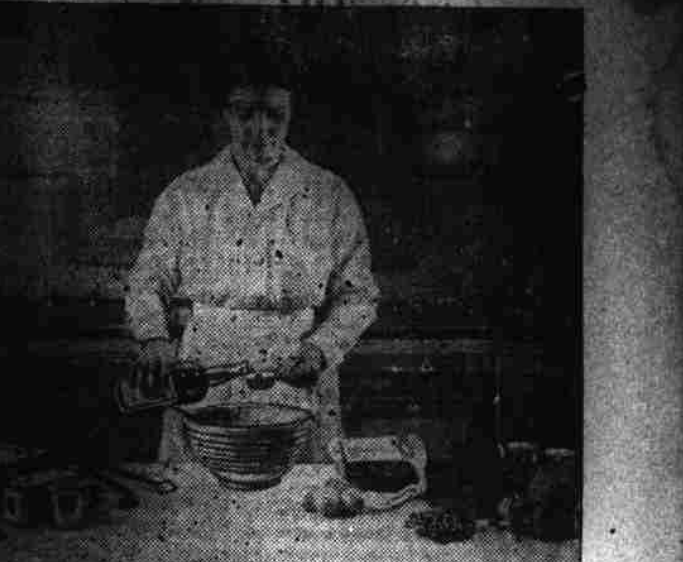

Christmas Fruit Cakes Should Be Made Now To Permit Proper Aging



Economy and Delicious Flavor Strike Happy Medium in Recipe Described Here

By JULIA MORWOOD, Director Modern Science Institute, Toledo, O. 'T won't be long now until you will begin to hear your friends say, 'Just think, Christmas is only a few weeks away.' If you and your family delight in having fruit cake as one of the delicacies for the Christmas feast, you may wish to prepare it now because as you know, this is one delicacy which, if properly stored, improves with age. At least four to six weeks should be allowed for ripening before cutting.

To improve the flavor of the fruit cake while aging, domestic Sherry wine or brandy should be added. Either pour small amounts of the wine or brandy on the cake at intervals of a week or ten days, or wrap it in a cheese cloth which has been saturated with either liquid.

Any fruit cake might be considered expensive because the fruit used usually must be added are usually costly items. However, because it is a delicacy we enjoy at festive seasons and may be used to many advantages in the holiday menus, we feel the added expense is justified.

- Christmas Fruit Cake
- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 4 eggs, well beaten
- 2 lb seeded raisins
- 1 lb currants
- 1/2 lb citron
- Rind of 1 lemon grated
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup baking powder
- 1/2 cup domestic Sherry wine
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 lb walnut or almond meats, chopped
- 1/2 lb candied cherries
- Juice of 1 lemon

Drudge all fruit and nuts with a 1/2 lb extra flour. Cream the butter, add sugar, eggs, molasses and 1 cup flour. To the remaining flour add the salt, baking powder, soda and sift well. Add this flour mixture alternately with the wine to which has been added the lemon juice and grated rind. Fold in the dredged fruit. Bake in pans which have been oiled and lined with heavy waxed paper. Bake at 250° for the first hour and a half. Then raise temperature to 300° for the remainder of the baking period. The cakes are done when they start to shrink from the sides of the pans, or they may be tested with a cake straw. The cakes should be stored in a cool place.

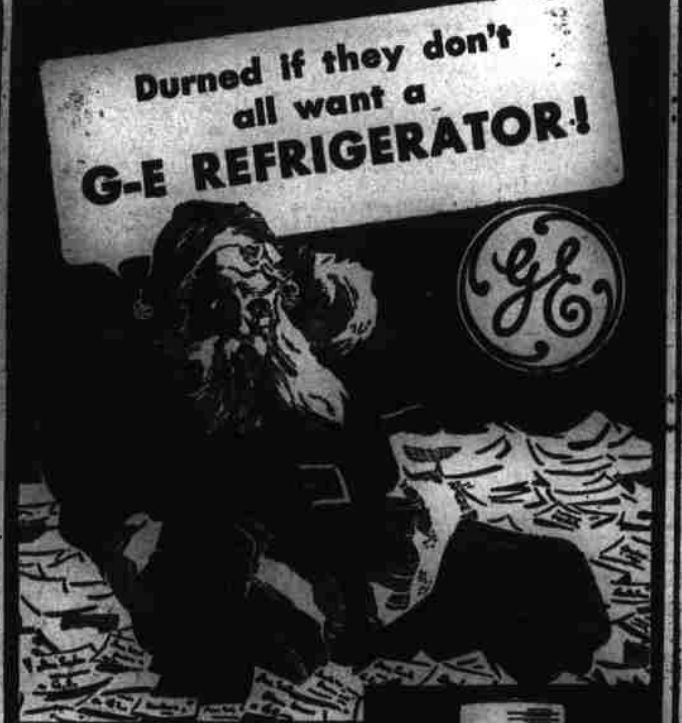
