MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

Whereas the President of the United States, has called on the people to unite in a national effort to cut down the rising tide of death and destruction on the streets and highways of the nation;

Whereas the Governor of North Carolina has pledged the cooperation of this state in this national effort;

Whereas the Law Enforcing Officers of North Carolina have inaugurated through The Institute of Governor a systematic and continuous program of Accident Prevention and Motor Vehicle Law Enforcement through the distribution of 500,000 copies of "Guides to Highway Safety";

Now, therefore, I, J. E. Jernett, Mayor of Kenansville call upon all high school authorities, all local officials and employees, all citizens' organizations and automobile drivers, and the heads of all business enterprises, to procure and study "Guides to Highway Safety" without delay, and to devote the first meetings of their respective organizations in January, 1936, to a program of accident prevention and motor vehicle law enforcement as the starting point of a larger program of crime prevention and criminal law enforcement.

You Must Pay If You Use Our School Buildings

It might interest the people of Duplin County to know that the school officials of the county are helpless when it comes to a matter of charging for the use of a school building for various kinds of meetings. Superintendent of schools Johnson stated this week that it was his desire as well as all principals and committees that the buildings be used by every person who desire them for a community purposes, but when it is used in the winter when heat is required or at night when light is required a small charge must be made as required by law. Reasons for making charges, as set out by the school commission are as follows:

"The charges made are in no manner a charge for the rental of the building, but to pay for the actual cost of operation of the school plant, which has been, or will be, charged to State funds. The Janitorial Service, Fuel, and Water, Light and Power provided by the State is for regular school work by State allotted teachers, and does not include any funds for any activities similar to the ones listed below: Cafeterias, Teachers' Homes, Principals' Homes, Janitors' Homes, Extension Classes, Kindergarten Classes, Plays, Community

It is not intended to discourage the use of the school buildings or curricular outside activities; however, it is unlawful to use or consume fuel, electric current, water, or any other of the facilities that will be paid from State School Funds for any other purpose than that for which they were provided, and they were provided only for the regular and necessary school work as carried on by the State-allotted teachers. No City, County, or State official has authority to permit the use of fuel or electric current for operation of the school plant for any purpose except regular and necessary school work, unless the State School Fund is reimbursed sufficiently to cover the actual cost.

Coast Line Foreman Arrested, Liquor

"Capt." James Ezzell, section foreman of the Atlantic Coast Line, located at Magnolia was nabbed by Sheriff Williamson, and Deputies Dale and Pope last Sunday morning at his home with 11 gallons of whiskey. He was put under \$150 bond for his appearance at County court Monday. Ezzell has been with the Coast Line for 28 years and would have been retired on a pension in another year and a half. According to reports he will probably lose his job. It is said that he was drawing a salary of approximately \$150 per month. Officers stated that they have been getting reports on him for a year, but this is the first time they have been able to catch him. Ezzell stated that he had the liquor for his wife who was sick. He has several children.

Johnnie Harrell Bound Over In Death Accident

At a coroner's hearing here Monday morning, probable cause was found and Johnnie Harrell of Tin City was placed under a bond for appearance at the next term of court, in the death of Isaac Brinson, near Tin City on November 29th. At the hearing evidence was brought out that Harrell was driving west towards Tin City about six o'clock in the evening and Brinson was walking in the same direction. Brinson, according to evidence of two witnesses and Dr. Johnnie Robinson, had been drinking. There was no evidence that Har-

rell was driving a new car. Almost at the point of the accident, Harrell met a car, which could have blinded him so that he could not see the man, according to witnesses. He was driving at a moderate speed. When he hit the drinking man he stopped, carried him to the doctor in Wallace and from there he was carried to the hospital. The coroner found probable cause without a jury.
