Sings in First
Comedy Role**

Barbara Stanwyck plays her first comedy role in "Red Salute," the rollicking Hollaender comedy which opens Monday and Tuesday at 8:30 at the Duplin Theatre. As Dora Van Allen, a madcap college girl, she meets a series of adventures and amusing situations which are played by Robert Young. Stanwyck is said to give the best performance of her career in this Howard Small production, presented by Harry M. Goetz.

The laugh-loud story is an original by Marjorie Pearson, and the screen play was prepared by the author in collaboration with Maxwell Hoff.

REVIEW

An intensely interesting character study of life in a small Midwestern community is presented by Katharine Hepburn in "Alice Adams," appearing at the Duplin Theatre Thursday and Friday of next week. Its human interest should strike a responsive chord in the hearts of all.

The production achieves its triumph through the genius of Miss Hepburn, whose portrayal of the sensitive, ambitious daughter from a poor provincial family in the Midwest is a triumph of subtle artistry rarely achieved by any star. Her gallant courage, her pathetic pretense to cover her heart-aches are portrayed with a finesse and dramatic repression which marks her as one with the outstanding actresses of the day.

The AAA plans to base its 1936 cotton contracts on the average production of the land withdrawn from cotton cultivation.

The exact amount of the adjustment payments next year will be determined by the price of cotton and amount of money available. Crumwell said, but it is safe to say

The AAA plans to protect the contract signers if they go down next year, Crumwell said, and for this reason provisions are being made to increase the adjustment payments.

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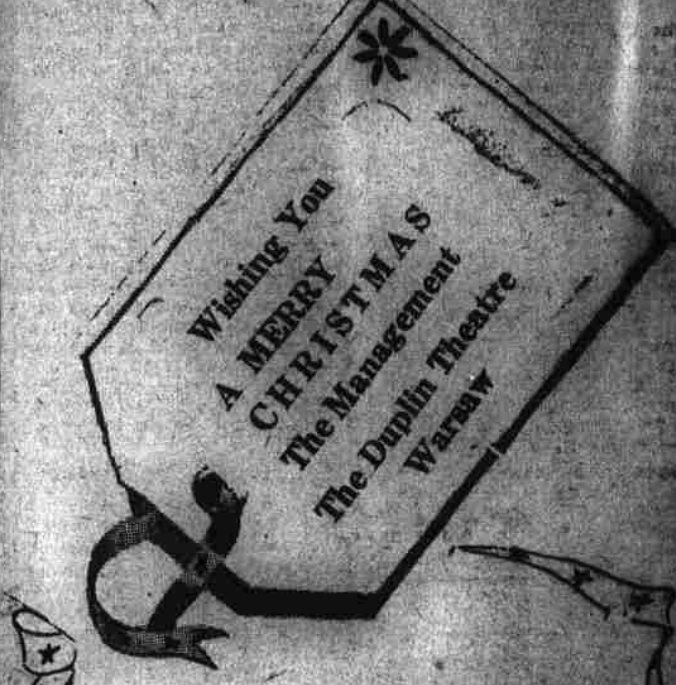
These without contracts will get only the amount for which they can sell their cotton on the market.

If the Bankhead act is discontinued, he went on, contract signers will be allowed to sell all the cotton they can raise on their allotted acreage.

A grower may adjust his 1936 acreage by 80 to 40 per cent of his base acreage and receive adjustment payments accordingly.
