

Judge Sinclair opened a one week term of Superior court here Monday for trial of criminal cases. Court closed Wednesday afternoon with the grand jury submitting its report.

Outstanding in the week's court was the trial and sentence of A. J. Wilson of Magnolia, charged with fatally shooting his wife on the night of December 19 at their home near Magnolia. Wilson, through his attorney Rivers Johnson plead guilty to second degree murder and was sentenced by Judge Sinclair to not more than 20 nor less than 15 years in the penitentiary.

Albert Cooper, negro of Kenansville, was given 3 to 5 years in the state prison for shooting Johnnie Kenan, negro, in Kenansville last Friday night.

Other cases disposed of were: Emil Raynor, charged with operating car while intoxicated. Judgment suspended on payment of costs.

Gordon Dobson was given 12 months on roads for trespass and larceny and receiving.

Maggie Hall was sentenced to not less than one nor more than two years for breaking an entering.

L. A. Grady, charged with embezzlement. Case dismissed.

S. H. Grady, arraigned on two charges was given a nol pros on count of assault with deadly weapon and drunken driving. On charge of drunken driving he was given a 12 months, suspended for two years on conditions and provided he pay court cost.

Lamb H. Whitfield was sentenced to 12 months for perjury.

Lark Wood of Warsaw was given 36 months for selling whikey. John Byrd was sentenced to

3 months on roads for drunken driving.
