## Forestry Notes

Ralph Miller was in town this week and reports that he is planning a county wide educational campaign for fire prevention. Mr. Miller will go into all the schools of the county and present his program in person to the children in the schools. He plans to begin with the Colored schools at an early date.

The wet weather has been valuable in fire control this season. However we do not know how soon the woodland will be dry and fire danger will arise, so lets be careful.

The fire towers of the county are property of the State Forestry Service and all persons should refrain from tampering with this property. Many of the younger folks like the thrill of climbing these towers, but we would advise that you do not climb the tower except with permission of the man in charge. You can cooperate with your County Department and in this way help prevent Forest Fires.
