Duplin County Medical Society Held Meeting February The 2nd.

The Duplin County Medical Society held a meeting in the office of the County Health Department, Kenansville, on Tuesday, February 2nd., at 7:00 P. M.

The principal speaker for this meeting was Dr. H. B. Ivey of Goldsboro who gave an illustrated lecture on "Cancer" by the use of slides. The lecture was most interesting and instructive. Dr. Ivey is chairman of a committee elected by the State Medical Society for the Control of Cancer in North Carolina and in cooperation with the State Committee the County Medical Society elected the following as a county committee for cancer control: Drs. R. L. Carr, Chairman, J. F. Landen and R. F. Quinn.

A report from the committee on cooperative medical services for low income farm families was made by Drs. J. D. Robinson, G. V. Gooding and J. F. Landen, who recommended certain by-laws which were adopted by the society. As a further committee pertaining to this matter the society elected Drs. G. V. Gooding and J. M. Williams, physicians and Dr. A. B. Bland, Dentist.

The medical society went on record in favor of holding regular meetings on Monday night after each fifth Sunday.

Mr. Quinn has a mandate before him to introduce such a measure. It was included in the county platform adopted at the convention last summer and was passed without a dissenting vote.

We have been informed that Highway Commissioner Waynick has said that the highway 111 from Grady school to Goldsboro is unfeasible. Again Mr. Waynick (if this statement is true) is failing to live up to his promise. If our last board of commissioners were

correct they repeatedly stated that highway 111 was second in the program for roads in Duplin and that they were promised the road. However we find that the road from Warsaw to Magnolia and Rose Hill will soon become a reality, it is said. This road was third on the list. Mr. Waynick stated that was a Federal project. We are glad that this road may soon be a reality because it is certainly needed but we also don't see why the people in the Albertson township section cannot have a road also. Maybe Goldsboro was a little too hasty in building the road to Broadhurst's Bridge. The truth is the road should go to Goldsboro via Seven Springs.
