Hoey Plans Prison Reform

Representatives from Duplin County were in conference with Governor Clyde B. Hoey on last Tuesday with reference to religious services in all prison camps in the state and were assured by the Governor that plans were already in the making to provide a religious service at each prison camp on each Sunday of the year, under the direction of the state committee who plan to use the local ministers and laymen in regular scheduled services. Mr. Hoey states that the burden of the legislature is now taking much of his time and it will perhaps be July 1st before a complete program will be worked out and put in action in all camps. Mr. Hoey stated also that he is planning to place only men of noble character in charge of these camps, as he feels that only men who will set a fine example should be entrusted with these prisoners.

Duplin representatives received assurance last legislative term that a program of religious services would be arranged for the camps, but such a program did not materialize. Mr. Hoey assures us that the religious program is assured this year. We hope that all ministers and laymen of the various communities will cooperate with Mr. Hoey and the state in this program.

Kenansville Back In Winning Ways

The Kenansville High School is back in their winning ways again. After losing to Wallace and Rose Hill since Christmas, the boys have found their stride again and beat the two leading teams in the county by good margins. Beulaville was beaten 21 to 17 and B. F. Grady 17 to 7. They lost a hard fought game to Chiquapia last week 21 to 15. However, this game came within twelve hours of the Beulaville game and the effects were quite plain.

The boys are going to Greenville next Wednesday to enter the Eastern Carolina tournament.  ty Agent or Assistant County Agent, or the Vocational Agricultural teacher in your community.

Lespedeza is fast becoming very popular in Duplin County as a hay crop, soil building crop, and a pasture crop. Several hundred lbs. of lespedeza seed have already been purchased cooperatively and we are expecting many other farmers to plant this fine crop in 1937 who have never planted it before. Payments will be made for seeding this crop out of the 1936 Soil Conservation Program and those acres planted in this crop will also count as soil conserving acres for the farmer.

The County Agent's office and the Vocational Teachers will be glad to assist any farmer, who is unable to secure his seed otherwise, in obtaining them. Other information about seeding, etc., will also be given gladly.

The farmers of Duplin County are leading all other Eastern counties in the tile drainage practice. We have assisted in securing for the farmers of this county already seven car loads of tile and several other cars will probably be ordered out before spring. This is a fine practice and we think it is saving the farmers money in the long run, by them being able to use more land instead of having fields cut up in open ditches, having to clean them out each year and having to cut ditch banks.

 ing us today grave dangers in government overhead. Our greatest hope for Duplin County in the future is a county manager. Three or five commissioners to act more or less as county directors, to hire a manager and take care of general business, that is as far as remote from politics as possible.

Representative Quinn now has a bill drawn for passage by the General Assembly to create five districts and let each district nominate its candidate for commissioner in the primary and the county at large vote on them in the general election. This bill provides that in the next general election the proposition be put before the people in a county wide vote. If a majority vote favorable to five commissioners then the bill becomes effective. If a majority vote against five commissioners the bill is automatically dead. The bill provides that the executive committee of the Duplin County Democratic party divide the county into five districts.
