matter. It is firmly held by all those who believe in democracy that there are three distinct divisions of government, the executive, the legislative, and the judicial. It was the purpose of our forefathers to keep these branches entirely separate and apart, to make each act as a check and balance to the others. By political maneuvers the legislative is sometime made subservient to the executive branch, but not for long. During the greater part of our history the three branches have been almost independent of each other.

As has already been pointed out above the judicial branch has, since the War Between the States, steadily gained the upper hand over the other two branches. It has become the dictator in certain instances.

But let us look at the President's proposal. What is it? on the face of it, with all due respect his proposal is a bold attempt to make the judicial branch subservient to the executive. That point is hardly debatable. Manifestly, there is no cure here for the evil which we have noted. This will not restore the ideal machine of checks and balances. It will merely change the dictator, not the dictatorship. It will give the president the dictatorial power which the Court now has. That is indeed no cure!

Then what is the answer to the problem?

The thing which we desire is a restoration of the normal condition of these three governmental branches. How that can best be accomplished is a debatable question. Senator Borah proposes a bill for repealing this dangerous clause of the Fourteenth Amendment. This proposal sounds reasonable to us, for it would automatically deprive the Court of its dictatorial powers. In the meantime, this silly attempt to make the court a division of the executive department of our democratic government should be thrown so far away it will never arise again. We are indeed pleased that our own Senator Bally is staunchly defending his belief in pure democracy as over against dictatorship, whatever it may cost him in a political way.



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
