PRESBYTERIANS PLAN EDUCATIONAL WORK

The Committee of Religious Education in session in Wilmington Tuesday adopted plans for the educational and promotion of work for the first part of the new year. Every church in the presbytery is asked to cooperate in this work and if possible to put on a school. We are hoping to have one and perhaps two outside workers in the presbytery during the Vacation Church period.

The Young People will have their conference at Peace College in Raleigh again this year. The Minister's Annuity Fund will be presented at Presbytery and an intensive campaign to put it across in the presbytery will be made under the direction of Dr. Gilmour.
