ADJOURNMENT

Well, the 1937 General Assembly is a thing of the past.

One of the shortest, yet one of the most active sessions is now history.

On Tuesday afternoon of this week the doors swung open between and Senate and House of Representatives, and the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate, facing each other across the long aisles and rotunda delivered their final words to the assembly.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The legislature, as a law making body, during these few weeks has vitally changed the picture of the social, economic and political life of North Carolina.

Social security legislation, with help for the dependent children and needy aged . . . Labor laws, regulating mill and factory workers and offering added protection to the growing youth who in many cases have been used by parents and employers to the physical disaster of the child. Laws which tend to do away with lean, tallow faces of these boys and girls who ought to be in schools instead of factories in their tender years, thus making room for adult employment, and assuring our state of a stronger and better society.

These regulations do not affect the farmer or small employer, and does not attempt to invade the sanctity of the home. Little can we know in eastern North Carolina of the dire need of such regulations, which will bless the coming generation of our sister counties west of us.

ADDED TAXES

For the Social security projects added taxes will follow in . . .

counties in the state. And while your own Representative and Senator fought against the county supplements, yet it is law.

But let's see how badly we are hurt. It is stated that the county will pay 1-4 of the sums to the needy old aged, the state will pay 1-4, and the Federal government will pay the other 1-2. Heretofore the county has borne the brunt of the burden. Now we have help, real help. We can still keep our need yusts low in Fender county, because there are comparatively few people who cannot provide means of livelihood; there are few people who want to be wards of society.

Now and then there may be one who feels the county and state owes him a living, merely because he is aged. But these cases will all be looked into carefully by the county welfare officer, and the county commissioners, who will pass on all applications.

Furthermore, just because a person happens to get on the assistance rolls is no reason that he will remain on them. There is no definite assurance that such help will continue to come in each month, regardless of conditions. It is **AID FOR THE NEEDY AGED** rather than any sort of a pension. Too, there is no definite minimum; a person may receive from \$5 to \$30 per month — depending on conditions.

Fair minded citizens want to help our needy aged, within our ability. But we are by no means a rich county, and cannot tolerate fanciful sums to those who have relatives or other means of support, nor can we afford to pay unjust sums of money to the aged, knowing that we may create loaf-

For example, if there is an aged person who has no means of support from his son or daughter, or who has a home and a fair income from his farm or business, there is no reason why he should receive assistance. To grant such parties assistance would mean in many cases that their children would stop work, go to hunting and fishing and loafing, and the system would topple of its own weight. Neighbors and citizens who struggle to pay taxes and support our schools, and government, are unwilling to create a system that will become oppressive to all of us. There will be a tendency under such a set-up for all of us to stop work and go on the assistance rolls, of one kind or another.

I very much hope Duplin county and the state at large will not abuse this new law, because it is a worthy act, if it is properly administered.

APPRECIATION

For the unfailing sentiment and support of all I have tried to do for my county, and my district, I hereby extend my grateful appreciation.

It has been my pleasure to witness the deep interest of my people in the future of their county, and to witness their desire to participate in making and moulding the economic and political structure of our unit of government.

This is a healthy sign. People who are interested in their government, as they would be in their own business eventually affect changes which benefit all the people.

I have kept the welfare of my folks in mind during the entire session, working, voting and hoping only for the best for my people. I had no other reason for being there.

Needless to say, I am extremely happy to be home again, with my family, neighbors and friends.

We have in this state a fine people, especially in the East and particularly in Duplin and Fender county! We have the resources, the climate, the means and methods of transportation which make for progress and well being.
