THE RELIABILITY

to the bull's eye." A few examples will illustrate this point.

Recently a high school agricultural class was discussing the reliability of crop estimates. The teacher asked one of the boys to stand up so the others could guess his weight. The various estimates ranged from 135 to 175 pounds. The average was 153-3-4 pounds. On the scales, the boy weighed 153 1-4 pounds - only 1-2 of a pound less than the average of all the guesses, which was nearer than any one's estimate.

A shot gun was fired accurately at a target. Of the 90 shot holes made, 13 hit the 2-inch bull's eye, but the AVERAGE of all shot holes was much nearer the exact cross-line center than even the nearest shot. The average of all would be used for ESTIMATING purposes.

The value of complete and reliable crop reports would be hard to over emphasize. The information is needed by farm leaders who are planning and carrying out agricultural programs. It takes out the guess-work and enables them to base the programs on known facts.

As is the case with any well managed business, reliable statistics on production, consumption, stocks of carry-over, and price trends are essential to safe and profitable farming.

It has definitely been proven that the North Carolina farmers try to give full and honest crop information to their tax later. They do not object to the principal of these surveys, but only to the inconvenience of waiting. It is, therefore, wise for farmers to avoid listing their taxables on Saturdays and late in the afternoons of other days.

Having their crop acreages officially recorded is meaning dollars and cents advantages to many growers, in their crop allotments and local farm programs. You may need much information later.

Be prepared to give your farm census information to your Township List Taker when you list your taxes.
