The High School Auditorium seating about 600 people was nearly filled Sunday Night for the special service in behalf of the Senoir Class in which the sermon was delivered by Rev. P. Cary Adams, President of Presbyterian Junior College at Maxton. Rev. W. C. Smith introduced Mr. Adams to the Senoir Class and their friends. The senoir Class sang a special anthem, "I Shall Not Pass Again This Way". Mr. Adams spoke on the life of Joseph as a challenge to the youth of to-day. Chicken Brooder Lost In Flames

A chicken brooder, housing between 300 and 400 little chicks, was burned Friday night at about one o'clock, belonging to Morris King, of Beaufort. The whole building was aflame when discovered by Mrs. E. D. Davis, on whose farm the brooder was located. Mr. King called to his neighbors and was able to save main buildings of the farm. The fire started in the brooder house, in which there were about 250 chickens less than a week old. It then spread to the hen house in which there were a few old chickens, feed and several tons of fertilizer. The wood and tool shed next was afire and burned to the ground a total loss. A small building in which the negro girl working in the home kept her belongings was a total loss. Only by the help of neighbors was the blaze stopped before reaching the garage from which it would have gone to the stables and pack house. The neighbors responded in a wonderful way to keep the damage as low as it was. The fire was only fifty feet from the dwelling house.
