Congressman Barden stated that Mrs. Roosevelt advised him to inform Mayor Aubrey Harrell of Wallace that she will accept the invitation extended to her several weeks ago by a group of ladies from Wallace headed by Mrs. John D. Robinson.

Other notables who are expected to attend are Governor and Mrs. Hoey, Senator Robert E. Reynolds, Governor Olin D. Johnson of South Carolina and Congressman

Graham Barden. Mayor Harrell, who has been the individual inspiration behind the festival for several years, states that he is extremely happy that the people of Wallace and Duplin County are fortunate enough to have the wife of the President of the United States as our guests. Mr. Harrell says that he has gone the limit in securing clean, wholesome entertainment for the festival and personally guarantees the biggest and best show Wallace has ever produced.

Dedicate New Warsaw Gym

The Thompson Gymnasium, Warsaw's new school gym, was dedicated last Thursday night and named in honor of J. C. Thompson, chairman of the school board. Approximately 600 attended the exercises which opened with a boxing match. Sarecta Ken'sville Road Is Closed

SARECTA ROAD CLOSED NEW FILL AND THREE NEW BRIDGES

The State Highway crew begun work Monday on the construction of new bridges and fill on the road leading from Sarecta to Kenansville. Work this week has been centered on the tearing out of the old river bridge. The fill across the swamp leading west from the river bridge will be widened and raised so as to be above the flood stage of the river. Plans to remove the series of bridges now used in the fill, and replace them with two large bridges have been announced. During the time that construction is in progress, the road will be closed to all traffic. Perhaps several months will be used in the construction work.
