Trucks, trailers, autos plying back and forth along the streets; people milling around here and there, doing a little shopping, a lot of talking and a heap of eating. About the center of town is seen a small shed where hundreds of people move through daily. Under the shed in the center is a dividing line and on each side of the line a steady stream of autos, trailers and trucks move along in quick alert fashion. Men are rapidly throwing open sawdust crates, inspectors give them a look once over, the auctioneer is chiming away his cry to the buyers for higher prices. Service boys are alert and unloading the berries as fast as trailers and trucks arrive up on the platform. Standing out from the shed one hears the cry of the auctioneer and the bid of the buyer through two loud speakers which have been hooked up.

P. G. Sutton, manager of the market, is more than pleased with progress it is making. The market is far ahead of last season and service is quicker than has ever been seen in Rose Hill. Farmers are leaving the stand with smiles on their faces and to date satisfaction has been expressed on every hand at prices received in Rose Hill.

Monday's sales this week shows a total of 110 crates sold ranging in price from \$2.10 to \$4.25 mostly \$2.60 to \$3.25. Tuesday showed about the same number of crates sold with prices averaging \$3.00, some selling up to \$4.70.

POOR PACKS

Poor packs on the market is holding prices down, Manager Sutton stated. He said that there are too many green and cold hurt berries found in packs. Farmers are urged to sell a better pack if they want the most for their crop. For instance, suppose you sell a bad pack, the market brings you the highest possible price. The buyer ships it north, the merchant sells it to a housewife. The housewife empties a cup of berries and finds a handful of green and cold hurt berries. She goes back and complains to the merchant, he shoots back at the commission merchant

and he falls back on the buyer. Result: prices go down. Sell a will work to bring you better prices. Supervise your picking and do not mix good and bad berries.
