Equalization Board Adjusts Valuations

The County Board of Commissioners and filed with the N. C. State Highway department on Monday, and constituting the county board of equalization and review, passed upon matters of taxation and valuation brought up for their consideration.

Among other things handled by the board was a recapitulation of Duplin FWA projects. Estimates submitted by Leslie N. Boney, architect. These are 12-room remodeled and new auditorium, at the Warsaw elementary school, \$22,500.00. Six-room school and auditorium to seat 350, Wolfscrape township, to cost \$18,000.00. Six-rooms in the present auditorium, and a new auditorium at Beaulville, to cost, \$14,350. Four-room addition to B. F. Grady school to cost, \$3,731.25. Twenty-two teacher, teacher-

AGE, at B. F. Grady school, cost, \$10,000. Four class rooms, added to the Chingnapin school, \$3,731.25. In addition to the above, five agricultural buildings for the county, one at Beaulville, Magnolia, Warsaw, Chingnapin and Wallace, each to cost, \$5,500, are included in the recapitulation. A resolution from citizens in the northwest section of the county asking for the paving of the road from Mt. Olive through to NC 11, following a route to be worked out by the highway commission, was approved by the commissioners and filed with the N. C. State Highway department. Citizens of Rockfish township, asked that a road, 7-10ths of a mile be placed on the county highway system.

Some to go to CCC Camps July 1

It is the plan of the Federal Government to continue the CCC camps, which have proven so popular, but they will continue with a reduced staff, which will make it impossible to enroll as many young men in the camps as previously. The age limits have been changed, the junior age limit now being 17 to 23. A few young men will be sent to the CCC camps from Duplin county, on July 1, which is the next date for enrollment.

400 Over 65 Dependent

In the recent survey made in the county it was found that there are more than 1,300 persons over 65 years of age. Of this number more than 400 are absolutely dependent. According to the set-up Duplin county will be able to aid only 274. This will work a very decided hardship upon the Welfare Board in the selection of the 274 to receive the aid.
