Says Meadow is Most Fertile Land

One of the most productive fields on the farm of Joe Brown in Madison County has not been plowed in 63 years.

It has been reseeded only once, and that was just after a flood some years ago had covered the field with several inches of silt.

This two-sers meadow alone at

This two-acre meadow along a creek running through his farm produces four to five tons of high

produces four to five tons of high quality hay every year, and consistently it is used to pasture cattle over the winter.

Brown told George W. Miller, farm agent of the State College extension service in Madison County that the sod of perennial grasses and legumes is so thick that noen of the soil has been lost in the past 63 years.
