

County Bonds

The Board of Commissioners of Duplin County, North Carolina, at its regular meeting held on the 10th day of July, 1937, passed the following resolutions:

1. That the Board of Commissioners of Duplin County be and it is hereby authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$10,000 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid existing bonded indebtedness of the County which was incurred by the Board of County Commissioners (as an administrative agent) of the State in providing a State system of public schools, for maintaining the educational system of the County for the year 1936-37, and is evidenced by the following:

\$1,000 5% School Funding Bonds dated October 1, 1925, maturing October 1, 1937.

\$10,000 4 1/2% School Funding Bonds dated March 1, 1928, maturing March 1, 1938.

\$5,000 4 1/2% School Building Bonds dated April 1, 1928, maturing April 1, 1938.

\$2,000 5 3/4% School Funding Bonds dated September 1, 1931, maturing September 1, 1937.

2. That bonds of Duplin County be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$7,500 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid existing bonded indebtedness assumed by Duplin County which indebtedness is evidenced by the following:

\$3,000 6% Calypso School District School Bonds dated February 1, 1921, maturing February 1, 1938.

\$1,000 6% Calypso Special Tax District School Bonds dated May 1, 1918, maturing May 1, 1938.

\$3,000 6% Faison Graded School District School Bonds dated September 1, 1921, maturing September 1, 1937.

\$500 6% Faison Graded School District School Bonds dated August 1, 1923, maturing August 1, 1937.

3. The holders of said \$25,500 Refunding School Bonds shall be subrogated to all the rights and powers of the holders of the indebtedness so refunded.

4. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said Refunding School Bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

5. That a statement of the debt of the County has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

6. That this order shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act, showing the assessed valuation of the County to be \$15,614,674, and the net debt for other than school purposes, including the proposed bonds, to be \$1,448,000. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest, if the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to be held at 10 o'clock A. M., July 19, 1937, or an adjournment thereof.
