ORDER AUTHORIZING \$45,000 REFUNDING ROAD AND BRIDGE BONDS

BE IT ORDERED AND RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Duplin County:

1. That bonds of Duplin County be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$45,000 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness of the County which was incurred before January 1, 1939 for the construction of roads and bridges in said County, and was legally created for necessary expenses of the County, and is evidenced by the following:

\$15,000 5% Road Bonds dated September 1, 1926, maturing September 1, 1937.

\$10,000 5% Road Bonds dated June 1, 1919, maturing July 1, 1938.

\$5,000 6% Road and Bridge Bonds dated November 1, 1920, maturing November 1, 1937.

\$15,000 6% Road and Bridge Bonds dated May 1, 1921, maturing May 1, 1938.

2. That the holders of said Refunding Road and Bridge Bonds shall be subrogated to all the rights and powers of the holders of the indebtedness so refunded.

3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said Refunding Road and Bridge Bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

4. That a statement of the County debt has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

5. That this order shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters. The foregoing order was finally passed on the 19th day of July, 1937, and was first published on the 22nd day of July, 1937. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

ORDER AUTHORIZING \$25,500 REFUNDING SCHOOL BONDS

BE IT ORDERED AND RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Duplin County:

1. That bonds of Duplin County be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act as amended in an amount not exceeding \$25,500 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness of the County which was incurred by the Board of County Commissioners (as an administrative agent of the State in providing a State system of public schools) for maintaining the constitutional six months school term, and is evidenced by the following:

\$1,000 5% School Bond dated October 1, 1926, maturing October 1, 1937.

\$10,000 4 1/4% School Funding Bonds dated March 1, 1928, maturing March 1, 1938.

\$5,000 4 1/4% School Bonds dated April 1, 1928, maturing April 1, 1938.

\$2,000 5 2/4% School Funding Bonds dated September 1, 1931, maturing September 1, 1937.

2. That bonds of Duplin County be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$7,500 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness which was lawfully incurred in erecting and equipping school buildings necessary for maintaining the constitutional six months school term and was thereafter assumed by Duplin County, which indebtedness is evidenced by the following:

\$3,000 6% Calypso School District School Bonds dated February 1, 1931, maturing February 1, 1938.

\$1,000 8% Calypso Special Tax District School Bonds dated May 1, 1918, maturing May 1, 1938.

\$3,500 6% Calypso General School District School Bonds dated September 1, 1931, maturing September 1, 1937.
