ROSEHILL
The Editor: Reference is made to the spelling of Rosehill as "Roschill."
The postoffice here was established November 2, 1872, on Rose Hill. On May 6, 1894, the name of the office was changed by the Postoffice Department to Rosehill. Since the name of the office has been "Rosehill" for 62 years, and very few people use the old spelling.

The United Postal Guide lists a Rose Hill in Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Mississippi and New York and a Roschill in North Carolina and Pennsylvania. The spelling of Rosehill as "Rose Hill" seems to be correct to Rose Hill, N. C.

Many orders forms, return request envelopes, the postmarking stamps and the cancelling machine dice of this office have for 45 years used the spelling "Roschill." This form is used by the railroad, the express company, the State
