The postoffice here was established November 8, 1875, as Rose Hill. On May 6, 1884, the name of the office was changed by the Postoffice Department to Rose Hill, N.C. The name of the office has been "Rose Hill" for 45 years, and you few people use the old spelling.

The youngest party to marry during the month was a 16 year old girl. The oldest party was a 65 year old colored man. White men average 37 with their mates at 23. Colored boys averaged 30 with their mates at 24.
