THE SECOND ANNIVERSARY OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

Washington, August-14—The Social Security Act was passed by Congress and signed by the President just 2 years ago. At the Washington headquarters of Region IV, which includes the District of Columbia, and the States of Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia, Mr. E. G. Parker, Regional Director, when asked to comment on the progress made to date, issued the following statement:

"On August 14, 1935, President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act, the most far-reaching piece of social legislation ever enacted in this country. It may be worth while to briefly review the results achieved, particularly as applied to the state of North Carolina.

"The Act, as is generally understood, includes those features involving State and federal cooperation, that is Public Assistance and Unemployment Compensation, and Federal Old-Age Benefits.

"In general outline, Public Assistance provides aid to the needy persons of 65 or over, dependant children, and the needy blind. The states enact their own laws and the federal government contributes a part of the cost. The amount of aid extended is determined by local administrative authorities in accordance with need disclosed by investigation.

"In Unemployment Compensation, state funds are being built up which will provide payments to eligible workers who are temporarily thrown out of employment. The cost of administering state plans is borne by the federal government.

"Federal Old-Age Benefits is the long-range plan providing against old-age dependency. It provides for monthly payments to eligible workers upon attaining age 65, or lump sum payments under certain conditions and in the event of death. These amounts are based on life earnings and the beneficiary is entitled to them as a matter of right, irrespective of any question of need or distress.

"On June 22, 1937, the Public Assistance plan of the State of North Carolina was formally approved by the Social Security Board. Under this it is estimated that during the month of August aid will be extended to approximately 5,000 needy old people, and this number will be substantially increased as the recently formed state organization gets further under way. Dependant children and needy blind will also bene-

fit. While individual amounts have necessarily been small, relief of acute distress has been larger in North Carolina, old age assistance and aid to dependant children is administered by the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, and aid to the needy blind by a commission for the Blind.

"On December 19, 1936, the Social Security Board approved the North Carolina Unemployment Compensation plan. While it is necessary to permit funds to accumulate until January 1, 1938 before payments are made, thereafter substantial assistance will be automatically provided for those temporarily out of work. As of July 31, 1937, the fund accumulated by North Carolina had reached nearly \$6,000,000.

"To properly register and keep a wage record of eligible workers under the Federal Old Age Benefits provision of the Act, nearly 62,000,000 account numbers have been issued. Of these some 633,000 are in the State of North Carolina. By this means a retirement income is assured these workers when they reach 65 after December 31, 1941, or a lump-sum payment in the event of death or the attainment of age 65 prior to that date. Such lump sums are now being paid. To assist in the preparation and filing to claims and to carry on the work of assigning account numbers, there have been established throughout the country over 290 field offices of the Social Security Board, of which seven are located in North Carolina, and it is contemplated that others may be required.

"Although from a humanitarian and sociological point of view, interest centers in the relief afforded those in distress, it is probable that indirect benefits will be broadly distributed. Thus it may reasonably be expected that the burden of supporting the indigent by private or local methods may be decreased.

"In the case of Industrial Communities subject to factory shutdowns, unemployment compensation payments will retain considerable purchasing power in the hands of the unemployed.

"In the space of two years, the entire Social Security program has gotten well under way. Its benefits have already been brought to hundreds and thousands of home-imperfections will no doubt be corrected in the light of experience gained. Its broad principals have become definitely established and will continue as an integral part of our American system."

Tobacco Leaf 35 Inches

Here comes another candidate for the honors of growing the largest leaf of tobacco in Duplin County this crop year. And this one will be hard to beat.

Three leaves from a giant stalk grown by Mike Owens on the farm of Daniel Baars, one mile North of Bowden, brought to The Duplin Times office, this week, measured, the largest 35 inches from stem to tip of leaf, and 17 1-2 inches at the widest point on the leaf. The other two measured 34 inches from tip to stem, and 16 1-2 inches across.

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
