ANSWEE: We only those birds that show evidence of being in-fested should be treated. This is usually evidenced by pale comba face parts and shanks and by the hirds being light in weight. If there is any doubt a representative pullet should be killed and the in-testines examined for worms. If worms are found, isolate all birds showing the symptoms and treat for control before placing in kay ing house.
