

WHAT'S WHAT ABOUT SOCIAL SECURITY

Question No. 38: I have just started in business and am desirous of knowing what information I should keep in order to make monthly reports under the old-age benefit taxing title of the Social Security Act.

ANSWER: The SS-1 form on which you will report the amount of taxes deducted from your employees and the amount you pay requires: (1) Number of employees; (2) taxable wages paid during the month; (3) employer's tax (one percent of No. 2); (4) credit or adjustment (which will not apply to first return); (5) total employer's tax; (6) employee's tax (one percent of No. 2); (7) credit or adjustment (no application in first return); (8) total employees' tax; (9) total amount of taxes (No. 6 and No. 8). You should also be sure and have each employee's account number.

Question No. 40: How can I get a job in the old-age benefits office?

ANSWER: The Federal Bureau of Old-Age Benefits is a department of the Federal Government. All employees, with the exception of a few experts in the Bureau, are taken directly from Civil Service registers.

persons do in order to qualify for old-age benefits: (1) He must be at least 65 years of age; (2) he must have earned not less than \$2,000 total wages from employment, not specifically exempted from the Act, after December 31, 1936, and before the age of 65; (3) he must have received wages from employment in some day in each of five years after December 31, 1936, and before the age of 65.

Question No. 42: Who collects taxes under this Social Security Act?

ANSWER: The taxes provided by the Social Security Act are collected by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, governed by such rules and regulations as the Bureau may make and subject to such penalties as are set forth in the Act and regulations issued thereunder.

Question No. 43: How many people must be employed in a store to have that store come under the Social Security Act?

ANSWER: For the old-age benefit section, one person is sufficient to bring a store under the Act. For the unemployment compensation section under the Federal Act, eight or more employees are necessary. Under the State acts this varies according to the different States from one to eight persons.

Corn in Silo Makes a Good Winter Feed

Comparatively few North Carolina farmers take full advantage of their corn crop in producing feed for winter consumption.

Corn made into silage produces more succulent roughage per acre than any other known crop, said F. R. Farnham, extension dairy specialist at State College.

The trench silo, he added, is the very thing for small farms where large upright silos would be impractical.

Trench silos, inexpensive and convenient, are also being used more and more on farms where large herds are kept, Farnham pointed out.

There is a growing tendency toward silage in preference to dry weather at harvesting time is less serious for silage than when hay is being out and cured.

Silage is succulent and keeps cattle in good condition through the winter. Silage production requires less acreage and, therefore permits the use of soil-building crops on land that would otherwise be needed for growing hay.

The construction of a trench silo is fairly simple, the specialist stated. A narrow trench should be dug on farms where only a few animals are to be fed.

Farnham said he has known of a father and son, using a team of mules with a plow and a slip-scraper, digging a silo and filling it in three days with enough silage to feed ten cows six months.

A cheap roof placed over the silo will help protect the feed from bad weather and keeps the walls from caving in, he added.

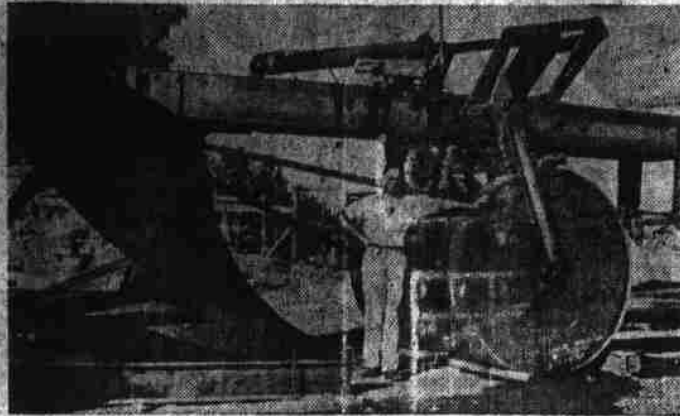

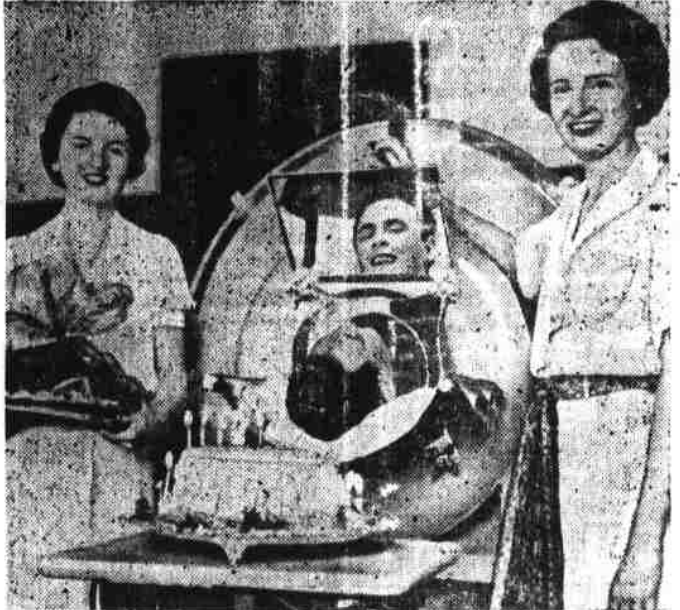

Huge Plow Will Cut Six-Foot Furrow



Huge plow constructed at a cost of \$3,400 which is designed to cut furrows six feet deep. It will be used in the Santa Ana river plains of California to recover rich loam soil buried under sand deposits by the 1916 flood. The machine will be pulled by two 95-horse-power Diesel-driven caterpillar tractors. The share will be nosed into and pulled from the earth by a powerful hydraulic hoist mounted on top of the frame.
