Death Takes Two in Surf Bathing

The past weekend took a toll of two deaths at Carolina Beach, when James Carl Marshburn, Jr., 17-year-old Raleigh youth died while in bathing at Carolina Beach Saturday, and J. Freeman Batton of Selma, 49 years of age, was pronounced dead, Sunday afternoon two hours after he collapsed after walking out of the surf near Kure's Beach as he and three kinsmen prepared to go on a fishing trip.

Resuscitation for Batton was tried by life guards from Carolina Beach and Kure's Beach for two hours, but the man was pronounced dead by Dr. H. C. Wyssong, of Wallace, at 1 p. m. The physician said death resulted from heart failure due to over-excitement. Batton leaves his wife and eight children.

Funeral services for James Carl Marshburn were held in Raleigh Sunday afternoon, and interment was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Young Marshburn and his friends had gone to the beach early Saturday for the week-end.

Surviving Marshburn are his parents and one sister, Miss Sarah Marshburn. He was a junior at Needham Broughton High School in Raleigh.

G'VILLE READY FOR OPENING SALES ON 26TH

GREENVILLE, August 19.—The Greenville tobacco market will open its 46th season on Thursday, August 26th, with five full sets of buyers, representing all the important buying companies in the world using bright leaf tobacco.

The ten large modern lighted warehouses located here covering sixteen acres of floor space, are sufficiently able to handle 2,225,000 pounds of tobacco daily. Each of these warehouses is managed by men of years' experience. Eight large and modern tobacco factories are located here, and the facilities of these markets has increased each succeeding year until there is no market in eastern North Carolina that has superior redrying, processing, stemming and storage equipment, than is

found on the Greenville market. During the tobacco season these two great industries employ approximately 6,000 persons.

One of the recent improvements on the Greenville market is the new factory built by the American Supplies, Inc. This new factory is one of the most modern to be found in Eastern Carolina. It is big, roomy, well-lighted, and will enable the company to handle almost twice the tobacco daily it was able to handle last year. This new modern factory is situated on Fourteenth and Pitt streets on the tracks of the Norfolk-Southern railroad and Pitt street.

The Person-Garrett Tobacco company, one of the largest buyers of bright-leaf tobacco on the local market, has added 2,000 feet on their already mammoth plant. This will enable them to handle approximately a quarter of a million pounds daily with the greatest of ease.
