

**CONTINUES ROLL
TOBACCO SALES RECORDS**

Sept. 4.—A time record for pounds sold during one week, and bringing the seasonal poundage for the market up to 13,896,806 pounds, which is the highest mark ever reached by the Lumberton Tobacco Market.

It is a selling day period. The 1935 season was sold during the first 10 days of the 1936 season which sales up to the present time, constituted a market record for volume. The past week also saw another market record shattered. On Thursday 871,392 pounds of tobacco were sold, breaking the former market record for a one-day sale. But this record was short lived; for on Friday, sales went to 900,013 pounds, setting a new high mark for the Lumberton warehousemen to shoot at.

Prices on the Lumberton market were just as pleasing last week as the poundage. Although every sale was dominated by low grade primings, heavy, luggy tobacco, and poor quality tips, the 4,198,854 pounds brought the growers who sold in Lumberton \$990,200.73, or an average of \$23.58 per hundred pounds. For the 13,396,806 pounds sold during the first 19 selling days of the season, growers have received \$3,208,884.2 or an average of \$24.04 per hundred pounds. Of course, the quality of the tobacco offered for sale determines the market average. As an illustration, better tobacco was moving several days ago, and for an eight day marketing period Lumberton sold 6,096,394 pounds of tobacco for \$1,567,203.87, or an average of \$25.83 per hundred pounds.

Every type of tobacco has sold well in Lumberton, prices remaining firm throughout last week. The only change from the high peak prices ascended to during the third selling week was a strong advance on tip grades and a very noticeable advance on the better tobaccos.

Although sales have been heavier than ever before in the history of the Lumberton market, there has been little congestion or confusion. Practically every day all warehouse floors have been cleared, leaving them clean and bare for the following day's sale.

The Lumberton market has shown a steady growth for the past several years. Last season the market made a big gain over 1935. In fact, Lumberton was the only one of the world's large tobacco markets to show an increase in sales last year. The fact that the market is bettering sales for this banner season makes this

year's record more remarkable. A steady, practically 20 per cent more tobacco growers are selling in Lumberton than sold there last year, and growers beyond all doubt the expression often used in this market's advertising to be true in every respect. "A popular market is a growing market. A growing market is a high market."
