

CAPTURE NEGRO BANDIT AT WALLACE SUNDAY NIGHT

James Marshall, 25-year-old negro, was arrested for a series of robberies and suspended of marriage, was caught in Wallace Sunday night by Chief of Police C. E. Morris, of Mount Olive, and Sheriff Williamson, of Duplin County, after being trailed by bloodhounds.

Marshall held up and robbed Mark Corbett and several other people at Corbett's filling station, in Wayne County, and forced Corbett and his 14-year-old son to carry him to Marshall on Corbett's new pickup truck. He released them there.

Officers took up his trail early Sunday morning and traced him to Wallace, where his trail was lost. Bloodhounds were called to aid in the hunt.

Marshall's course of action closely resembled that of an unknown negro who ran over and killed Frank Taylor in Nash County, Friday, and afterwards robbed several people. However, soon after his capture Marshall admitted the robberies in Wayne county, but denied any knowledge of the Nash county incident.

He is being held in Goldsboro.

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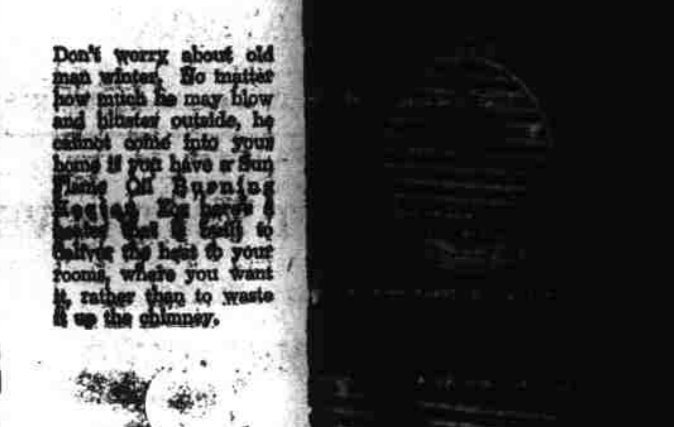
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
