Whiteville Market Is Already Ahead Last Year's Sales. With tomorrow's sales, Whiteville market will have striped last year's sales by a good margin, Sales Supervisor M. C. Smith announced today. By all indications, this season will be the best that the Whiteville market has ever experienced. The sales are running ahead of the business year (1933), during which only one set of buyers was retained after the first of October. This year there will be two sets of buyers retained.

Sales Monday totaled \$34,988, average \$33.23, bringing total season to 13,921,165, at \$23.60; therefore, it is safe to assume with Tuesday's sales, the grand total for the season to date is far greater than the entire 1933 total. This proves conclusively that thousands of new customers are selling their entire crop on the Whiteville Market—where grades for grade prices are extremely high. The heat-wave during July damaged the local crops immensely, but our farmers realize the warehousemen in Whiteville carry every basket to the top price. Prices during the last week have ranged up to seventy-five cents while hundreds of farmers averaged better than 40 cents on their offerings.

Sales Supervisor Smith, of the Whiteville market, has estimated that about 60 per cent of this year's crop through this section has been marketed. He has come to this opinion after talking with farmers who have not sold and others who have sold only small amount or divided with their tenants. One farmer with 25 acres of tobacco stated that he sold 1800 lbs. which averaged him 41 cents on the local market. Another stated that one of his tenants sold his share of tobacco on another market for 31 cents, that he, the owner, came to Whiteville and got 42 cents for his.

There seems to be not so much good tobacco in the Eastern and Middle belts as tobacco companies expected, therefore prices for the better grade weeds are unusually high here. Farmers are being urged to sell now while the prices continue strong and not to take a chance of losing money by a drop in the market.
